

## THE FIRST VOYAGE OF SINBAD THE SAILOR

I bought a large quantity of merchandise and made preparations for a long voyage. Then, with a company of traders, I set sail from Baghdad and journeyed many days from isle to isle, buying, selling and exchanging wherever we dropped anchor.

At last we came to a little island that seemed very beautiful. The passengers went ashore, lit fires, and were soon busy cooking and washing. Some began to eat, drink and be merry, whilst others set out to explore the Fair Isle. Suddenly the captain cried aloud from the ship,

"Come aboard speedily. Leave everything and run for your lives. God be with you, for this is no island, but a huge whale floating on the surface of the ocean. On its back sands have settled and trees have grown. The heat from your fires has awakened it. It will plunge below the surface and all will be lost."

Immediately, there was panic. Terrified visitors threw themselves into the sea. Those who could swam desperately towards the ship. There was a calm before the storm - the expected awakening of the great beast seemed not to occur. The panic subsided: could this really be a whale? Then, slowly and gently, the 'ground' beneath those still on the 'island' began to rise and fall. Then, without warning, the creature raised its back high out of the calm waters, catapulting all who were still standing, through the air and into the water beyond. The huge bulk came crashing down, sending plumes of water and foam high into the air, and engulfing the ship in a torrent of water.

Answer the following questions in FULL SENTENCES - NOT one of two word answers- you must begin by using most of the question in your answer.

1. What occupation or trade did Sinbad follow?  
Sinbad was a trader or merchant - he bought and sold goods.
2. How do we know that it was some time before they came to the little island?  
We know it was some time until they came to the island because they journeyed many days and then it says 'at last'.
3. What two words in the story tell us that the island was pretty?  
The two words which tell us the island was pretty are beautiful and fair.
4. What did the passengers do when they went ashore?  
The passengers ate, drank and enjoyed themselves.
5. In reality, what was the island?  
In reality, the island was a huge whale.

6. How had the island become sandy and covered with trees?  
The island had become covered in trees and sandy as the whale must have been resting at the surface of the sea for a long period of time and must not have been moving.
7. What effect did the fires have on the island?  
The fire eventually caused the whale to move and rise out of the sea.
8. Why are *'island'* and *'ground'* enclosed in inverted commas?  
The inverted commas are used to indicate that the writer does not really mean 'island' or 'ground', but he is showing what the passengers initially thought they were.
9. Explain what *'engulfing'* means in this story.  
Engulfing means the sea surrounded or completely covered, or overwhelmed the ship on the ocean.
10. What does *'there was a calm before the storm'* mean in this context?  
'The calm before the storm' is a metaphor which relates to the whale initially remaining still, then only moving slightly, until the huge powerful, dramatic movements as it launched itself out of the water.
